Simple Tips for Learning Success

- Talk to your child, encourage them to ask questions;
- Sing songs, and share rhymes;
- Make books a part of everyday life. Snuggle up and read;
- Make connections between signs, labels, pictures and words;
- Use math language throughout the day (numbers, shapes, sizes, up, down, right, left, under, over, near, far);
- Encourage drawing. Pictures represent words. Scribbling turns into lines and line into letters;
- Encourage imagination. Pretending builds confidence.

Building Vocabulary – Why you can't skip reading today Source: Nagy & Herman 1987

- If you read for 20 minutes a day, 3,600 minutes in one school year, you will have read over 1,800,000 words.
- If you read for 10 minutes a day, 1,800 minutes in one school year, you will have read over 1,000,000 words.
- If you read for 5 minutes a day, 900 minutes in a school year, in one year you will have read over 1,000,000 words.
- If you read for 1 minute a day, 180 minutes in a school year, in one year you will have read just over 8,000 words.
